Joint Statement on Protecting the Filipino Consumers

March 30, 2026

We, the undersigned Philippine Business Groups, express our deep appreciation to the national government, through Finance Secretary Frederick D. Go, for convening us to discuss the Middle East Crisis and to explore collaborative measures that will safeguard Filipino consumers and the Philippine economy.

We recognize that volatile global oil prices pose serious threats to our nation's economic stability and the welfare of our people. To mitigate the numerous risks, the following were clarified, proposed and discussed:

1. SECURING SUPPLY – Establishing government-to-government oil procurement with non-traditional partners, such as Russia, Indonesia, and India.
2. PRICE STABILITY – Maintaining steady interest rates and reducing non-fuel costs to prevent surges in the prices of basic commodities.
3. TARGETED SUBSIDIES – Providing direct support to marginalized transport groups (such as jeepney and bus operators) to cushion the impact of rising fuel costs without triggering fare increases.
4. BUY LOCAL – Promoting local industries and Philippine-made products to protect jobs and strengthen resilience against global supply chain shocks.

As partners in nation-building, we commit to a whole-of-nation approach. Specifically, we pledge to:

1. CONSERVE ENERGY – Implement aggressive energy-saving measures across corporate and industrial facilities.
2. OPTIMIZE LOGISTICS – Adopt flexible work models to significantly reduce transportation fuel demand.
3. PROMOTE A CULTURE OF CONSERVATION – Encourage our workforce to embrace sustainable energy habits both at work and at home.
4. DEVELOP RENEWABLE ENERGY SOURCES – Invest in and accelerate the adoption of alternative energy solutions, particularly solar power, to reduce dependence on imported fuel and strengthen long-term energy security.

Unity is our greatest strength in navigating global instability. We thank Secretary Go for this vital collaboration and reaffirm our commitment to continuing dialogue with the government to protect Filipino consumers and ensure economic resilience.

2. An appeal to President Ferdinand Marcos Jr.: Make ‘Buy Pinoy, Buy Local’ the non-negotiable foundation of government procurement – By: FPI CE, Dr. Jesus Lim Arranza

MR. President, the Philippine government is the single largest consumer in the country. Yet, for too long, our hard-earned taxpayer pesos have been leaked abroad to support foreign factories and foreign workers through imported public procurement. This column is submitted as an urgent appeal, on behalf of the entire membership of the Federation of Philippine Industries—whose members are all manufacturers—to make “Buy Pinoy, Buy Local” the mandatory cornerstone, indeed the non-negotiable foundation, of your administration’s economic strategy.

By issuing a new Executive Order or Administrative Order that makes the procurement of locally manufactured goods across all government agencies and GOCCs mandatory, you can spark an industrial revolution that accelerates the growth of domestic industries and creates millions of jobs—an approach aligned with the advocacy of the FPI and the Federation of Filipino-Chinese Chambers of Commerce and Industry. The FPI and FFCCI jointly launched the “Buy Pinoy, Buy Local” campaign in 2008 to strengthen Philippine industries and protect local jobs.

By redirecting the government’s substantial purchasing power toward domestic enterprises, the Philippines can shield its industrial base from the harmful effects of the war in Iran, supply chain disruptions, and global volatility.

My consistent argument is that local procurement primarily benefits us by creating a resilient industrial base, one that can endure global shocks. When the government commits to buying locally produced steel, cement, and other construction materials, it incentivizes manufacturers to maintain or even expand operations. Instead of shutting down production lines during a global downturn, local factories retain the capability to operate because they have a huge guaranteed buyer: the State.

Strengthening supply chain autonomy

The fragility of global supply chains was exposed brutally during the 2020–2021

pandemic and further exacerbated by the ongoing conflicts in Eastern Europe and the Middle East. Shipping costs skyrocketed, container shortages became the norm, and lead times for imports stretched from weeks to months.

Government procurement that favors local products acts as a catalyst for supply chain localization. When government agencies—including the Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH), the Department of National Defense (DND), and the Department of Health (DOH)—mandate local sourcing, they force the development of local supplier ecosystems.

This is a win-win policy: For example, if the DPWH prioritizes locally manufactured steel, it not only benefits the steel mill but also encourages the growth of local logistics providers, scrap metal recyclers, and fabrication shops. This creates a self-sustaining cycle where the supply chain is shorter, more visible, and more controllable. In times of crisis, a localized supply chain can be rerouted, secured, and mobilized far faster than one dependent on international shipping lanes.

A common argument against local procurement is the perception that local products are more expensive than imported ones. However, prioritizing local procurement acts as a catalyst for industrial expansion.

When the government—the largest single buyer in the country—buys local, it is assured of quality products because our manufacturers have been strictly following the standards set by the Bureau of Philippine Standards ever since. For so long, FPI has been helping government in running after substandard products entering the country that can cause serious harm to our consumers.

In fact, we are launching STANDARDS PHILIPPINES Magazine in a few days. Our goal is to make this magazine an authoritative resource on standards, which will educate consumers about product quality, collaborate with local government units to familiarize them with mandatory standards, and engage with lawmakers to

strengthen legislation surrounding product quality. The commitment to standards is a collective responsibility that concerns all Filipinos.

Furthermore, the certainty of government demand allows local firms to invest in expensive capital equipment and research and development (R&D). Over time, this

transforms most industry players into world-class manufacturers capable of exporting goods, reversing the long-standing trend of deindustrialization. 3. Customs helping agriculture sector during Middle East crisis – By: Ernesto M. Ordoñez

MANILA, Philippines — During this Middle East crisis, the government and private sector must improve their communication and joint action. Here is an example of the Bureau of Customs (BOC) and the private sector doing exactly this. It should be replicated in many areas.

On the government side was Commissioner Ariel Nepomuceno, with his commendable openness to the private sector, wise judgment and swift action.

Those from the private sector who gave inputs included Tomas Medina, Ruben See and Imelda Madarang. All are participants in the public-private Philippine Council of Agriculture and Fisheries (PCAF).

In addressing this crisis, Agriculture Secretary Francisco Tiu Laurel Jr. moved decisively in critical areas, such as food hubs, solar irrigation, organic fertilizer and refrigeration facilities. In its March 23 quarterly meeting, PCAF's Committee on International Trade (PCAF-CIT) cochair Agriculture Undersecretary Philip Young highlighted the crisis' negative impact on our agriculture exports.

Exports

In 2025, Philippine exports increased by 22 percent, higher than Vietnam's 14 percent and Thailand's zero percent. But the crisis has stopped this momentum. This is when the BOC's role in agriculture exports came up.

At the meeting, it was stated that the

exporters' containers had failed to reach their intended destinations because the regular routes were no longer passable. To retrieve their containers, the exporters had to follow the difficult import procedure that the BOC implements.

This procedure was adopted to deter smuggling. Unfortunately, this process sometimes takes four weeks to four months before the cargos are released. Also, it may cost from P200,000 to P500,000 per container per month.

On March 24, private-sector PCAF-CIT participants contacted Commissioner Nepomuceno. They wanted a change in the procedure for taking back their containers. Many had perishable food that would not survive the normal long import procedure.

Containers

These containers fall into four categories. The first includes the containers stranded at sea because the travel routes have been cut off. The second includes those stuck in transshipment ports like China, Korea, Taiwan and Singapore.

The third includes those diverted to India, but this new route through India does not work. The fourth includes those still at Philippine ports, which also have to go through the tedious import clearance process.
